### FROM THE EAST

Brethren and ladies:

I sometimes think that one of the hardest duties of the Master of the lodge is to write his article for the Trestleboard. What can he say to inspire, educate or encourage the lodge members? I do not claim to be the most knowledgeable brother in matters of Masonic esotericism or history. I only can try and bring you some of my thoughts of how I see things in our lodge, Freemasonry, or in society in general. I also believe that I can help guide and teach those who want to be future officers or committeemen so that they can lead our lodge beyond the time I will serve as Master.

In case you haven't picked-up on it yet from my past articles, my goal is to revitalize Ionic Composite Lodge, not to be the thousand plus member lodge we were in the past, but to return that feeling of brotherhood and tolerance among the brethren, and their active planning and participation in lodge meetings and activities. Some brothers only came to be waiters at the Stated Meeting, while others, were involved in the different committees of the lodge. Some only came for social activities, while others were solely involved in ritual.

I have often said that Freemasonry should think of itself in a similar manner to the Marine Corps. The Marines do not say that everyone should become a Marine, they say they are only looking for "A few good men". They also have a bond amongst themselves as brothers because they share the common experience of boot camp, that takes them from individual to "Marine". They also say, "once a Marine, always a Marine". Our initiation experience should take those who seek to join us from a "normal" person to an individual who should always be seeking to improve himself as well as help his brothers and community. 

#### HIGHLIGHT ON RELIEF: MASONIC SENIOR OUTREACH SERVICES

Masonic Senior Outreach Services (MSOS) provides ongoing geriatric care management, at no cost, to California Master Masons, their wives, widows and mother with a demonstrated need. Needs include, but are not limited to: social isolation and lack of local social support, health and wellness issues, unsafe plans for aging and confusion about care planning. MSOS Care Managers work regionally, maintaining regular visit schedules and telephone contact to con-

tinuously assess elders' health, financial, social and mental status. Financial aid is also need-based and offered to California Master Masons in Good Standing for the five consecutive years prior to applying for aid, who are age 60 or older, 55 or older and permanently disabled. The amount of financial aid is determined by need and will change as needs change. In establishing your budget, MSOS considers public benefits and support available from family and lodge. Masons and their families receiving MSOS financial aid sign an Agreement to Repay, which states that monies expended will be repaid if circumstances change and they have the financial means to do so. Repayment monies are placed back into a general fund for the future relief of Masons and families in distress.

### THINK ABOUT IT

We live in a society that is filled with numerous special interest groups that compete with each other for attention, privilege, money, and whatever other advantages they can gain. The downside of these activities is that, whatever is gained for that particular group becomes a loss for some other group or for other individuals.

As most of you know, I am a retired physician who spent over 30 years practicing academic medicine as a gastroenterologist in a public teaching hospital that is part of the UCLA training system. I recently received a letter from a special interest group composed of gastroenterologists and known as AGA PAC. This group was asking me to contribute at least \$250 to allow them to continue their mission of representing gastroenterologists in Washington, D.C.

AGA PAC claimed to be the voice of gastroenterologists and that having a strong PAC (presumably standing for political action committee) would allow us to maintain our role as the "trusted voice" for federal legislators. I was puzzled by this last statement, as I could not understand how a lobbying group that spends time and money courting politicians could ever be viewed as being trustworthy.

Medicine is a unique occupation; in how many other situations do customers voluntarily come in and take off their clothes? Our trust-

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worthiness should not be to politicians, but to patients. If there is a conflict of interest, our decisions always have to fall on the side of those patients, even if it costs us personally.

AGA PAC does not represent patients directly, although it would have me believe that it does so by supporting gastroenterologists' goals. I say this because some of the competition that AGA PAC faces are other similar physician PACs lobbying for their special interests. I do not understand why all of these various medical PACs do not unite as PATIENT PAC, decide and prioritize what would be best for overall healthcare, and then lobby for that agenda. Gastroenterologists might find that some of their objectives had to give way to other more important ones because of the limitation of resources, but that then becomes one of those personal costs that doctors are obligated to bear. If medicine loses the confidence of patients, no PAC will ever get it back.
