

That’s when I realize that my kids get to be part and grow in a nation that holds “liberty and justice for all” as one of its principal tenets and I couldn’t be any prouder.



THINK ABOUT IT

Earlier this week, a 4-year-old boy somehow managed to fall into a gorilla enclosure at the Cincinnati zoo. Park officials came to the spot and a decision was made to shoot the gorilla rather than risk the safety of the young boy. The result of that decision was an outpouring of anger and accusations from a number of people who were not there at the time.

The arguments were largely in favor of the gorilla. People blamed the parents for not paying closer attention to their son. People blamed the zoo designers for not making the barriers strong enough. People blamed the zoo officials for not using a tranquilizer instead of a lethal bullet.

Several people to whom I talked had similar opinions and believed that the gorilla need not have died. When I asked them what they would have done, an almost universal answer was that it never would have happened to them because they would have paid closer attention to their child. So I posed a hypothetical question, namely suppose your child went to the zoo on a school trip and you got an emergency phone call telling you that your son or daughter was now in the gorilla pit with a very large gorilla; the person calling you was asking you, at the moment when the crisis was occurring, if you

wanted the zoo to shoot the gorilla. Universally my acquaintances said that they would have requested that lethal solution.

It is so easy, after the fact, to decide what the very best solution would have been. However, at the moment of the crisis, one has to act. The zoo officials had, as their top priority, the safety of that little boy and they acted accordingly. At that time, they made what they believed was the best decision. This is how life works; what we all have to do all of the time is make the best decision at the moment and then move on.

Consider an imaginary machine called a retrospectoscope; it allows the user to have all of the time and true information that is obtainable before making a decision. My machine is correct 100% of the time. Unfortunately, it is useful 0% of the time. From my perspective, the zoo acted correctly in an emergency and should not be the victim of societal scorn. Monday morning quarterbacking is only useful for learning for future events, not for solving problems at the time.

Think about it.

The Exile and the Rebuilding of King Solomon's Temple:

- Freemasonry & the End of the Davidic Monarchy
- The Return from Exile and the Rebuilding of the Temple
- The "Embassy Degrees" in Freemasonry

Our story of Freemasonry and the Holy Land now resumes. Today we began our journey at the Sea of Galilee, and end it at Jerusalem. A key feature of our journey is the River Jordan, a river steeped in song and story from ancient times. And it also plays a part in Freemasonry, as we will soon see. But first we have to go back in time to understand the next part of our story.

You may remember that in 587 B.C.E. the great Temple of Solomon was destroyed by the invading armies of Babylonia under King Nebuchadnezzar II. Not only was the Temple burned to the ground, and its sacred treasures hauled off to Babylon, but key leaders of the Jewish people were also enslaved and marched to Babylon. This event is called the Babylonian Exile, and one of the great poems from the Bible commemorates this. Psalm 137 is a poignant reminder of the tragedy experienced by these exiles:

By the waters of Babylon we sat down and wept, when we remembered you, O Zion.
As for our harps, we hung them up on the trees in the midst of that land.
For those who led us away captive asked us for a song, and our oppressors called for mirth: "Sing us one of the songs of Zion."
How shall we sing the Lord's song upon an alien soil.
If I forget you, O Jerusalem, let my right hand forget its skill.
Let my tongue cleave to the roof of my mouth if I do not remember you,
if I do not set Jerusalem above my highest joy.

This situation occasioned the creation of another set of Masonic legends, and the degrees associated with them. The Exile to Babylon furnished the creative genius of the Masonic degree-writers of the 18th century with another occasion for their storytelling.

These creative Masonic writers, whoever they may have been, were intrigued not only with the Exile itself, but with the Return from Exile, the story of which was told in the Bible. In 539 B.C.E. another great kingdom to the east of Babylonia, the Persian Empire, swept down on Babylon, and under the leadership of Cyrus the Great, destroyed the Babylonian Empire and replaced it with the rule of the Persians. Cyrus is credited with allowing the Jews at Babylon to return to their homeland in 538 B.C.E., and they took advantage of this to rebuild the Temple of Solomon - although probably on a much reduced scale. The story of this is found in the books of Nehemiah and Ezra in the Bible, and from these sources the Masonic degree writers drew their material.

The Degree of Excellent Mason, now a part of the sequence of degrees governed by the Allied Masonic Degrees of the United States of America, tells the story of how the Exiles began their return. Then the Royal Arch Degree picks up the story. Royal Arch Masonry in the United States is a four-degree system, the first step in the York Rite. All Royal Arch Masons must first be Master Masons. The Royal Arch Degree itself incorporates the story of the Return from Babylon, and postulates that the Exiles journeyed up the River Euphrates to near its headwaters, and then descended through Syria into Israel and Palestine. The last part of the journey is along the banks of the River Jordan, which is eventually crossed, with the Exiles then climbing the steep road from Jericho to Jerusalem. The Exiles in this story are three, and the number three has significance in Freemasonry. These Exiles are called "sojourners," and they are led by a Principal Sojourner who describes the journey for them. There is some beautiful wording in the ritual used by their guide. An example:

"How beautiful is the scenery along the banks of the famous Euphrates. It rises in the mountains of Armenia, flows westwardly and empties into the Erythrean Sea. The river Tigris finds its source very near the headwaters of the Euphrates, takes a southeasterly course, and unites with the Euphrates

before it reaches the sea.

We have left the river and are traversing the Syrian desert, which borders the one we avoided. No water anywhere. Oh! See the beautiful foliage in the distance. It is "Tadmora in the Wilderness." It is a most delightful spot.

All this country was conquered by King David, and Tadmora was built by King Solomon, who inherited the kingdom from the Euphrates to the Mediterranean, and from the mountains of Lebanon to the Red Sea. Its beautiful palm trees, pure water, and the munificence of King Solomon have made this oasis in the desert to blossom as the rose. Caravans stop here while on their long journeys. But Tadmora will become a heap of ruins, desolate and forsaken by Him whom its people forsook."

I think you get the idea. The journey home is a joyous occasion, as every "homecoming" should be. I'll leave the rest of the Royal Arch story for later, when we learn more about the Temple of Solomon. However, the story of King Cyrus and his permitting the Exiles to return to Jerusalem, captured the imagination of degree writers in the 18th century, and there some Masonic degrees which tell that part of the story.

According the Masonic legend, Zerubbabel, was the leader of the Exiles and he was sent from Jerusalem to King Cyrus to confirm the royal decree which not only allowed them to return, but to rebuild the City of Jerusalem with its defensive walls, and also the Temple itself. Zerubbabel travels to the court of Cyrus the Great to receive this confirmation. Because Zerubbabel is on a diplo-

matic mission, his journey is termed "an embassy", and the Masonic degrees associated with this story are called the "Embassy Degrees." In American Freemasonry they are to be found in three different organizations, and they all tell essentially the same story. The Order of the Red Cross of Palestine in the Knight Templar series is one of these degrees, the 15th and 16th degrees of the Scottish Rite is the same story, but with the material divided between two degrees instead of one, and finally, the story is divided into three degrees in Knight Masonry: Knight of the Sword, Knight of the East, and Knight of the East and West. In all of these Zerubbabel is commissioned by Cyrus to confirm his original decree of allowing the city and temple to be rebuilt.

In working on the walls of the city, Zerubbabel and his fellow exiles are said to have worked with a stonemason's trowel in one hand, and a sword to defend themselves in the other. The "Sword and Trowel" therefore often appear as emblems in the "Embassy Degrees." There are also other symbols of importance in these stories, and chiefly the symbol of the Bridge Over the River Jordan. The River Jordan assumes a mystical meaning in these degrees, separating the Holy Land from that not so designated. This dividing line is echoed in another tradition, a non-Masonic tradition, associating the River Jordan with the boundary between life and death, and found in some of the beautiful African-American spirituals. One of the more well-known spirituals in this genre is "Michael, Row the Boat Ashore." In it, the Archangel Michael is ferrying souls across the River Jordan to the "Promised Land" of heaven. Whether this symbolism is derived from the Masonic stories, or had an independent origin is unknown.
